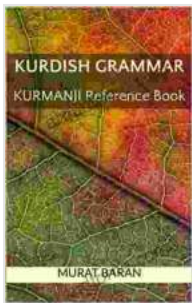

3. Complex

1 Independent Clause & 1 or More Dependent Clauses

Tom cried because the ball hit him.

4. Compound-Complex

2 or More Independent Clauses & 1 or More Dependent Clauses

Tom cried because the ball hit him, and I apologized immediately.

<p>NOMINATIVE CASE: If a Noun or Pronoun is used as the subject of a verb, it is said to be in the Nominative Case.</p> <p>Examples: Mr. Reddy taught us English. The flower gives us fragrance.</p>	<p>OBJECTIVE CASE: If a Noun or Pronoun is used as the object of a verb, it is said to be in the Objective Case.</p> <p>Examples: Mr. Reddy taught us English. The flower gives us fragrance.</p>
<p>DATIVE CASE: If a noun is used as an indirect object of the verb in a sentence, it is said to be in the Dative Case.</p> <p>Examples: Mr. Reddy taught us English. Vankar has given Susan some amount.</p>	<p>POSSESSIVE CASE: If a Noun denotes the possession or ownership, it is said to be in the Possessive or Genitive Case.</p> <p>Example: This is Mr. Madhav's car.</p>
	<p>VOCATIVE CASE: If a noun is used to name or call a person or thing addressed, it is said to be in the Vocative Case. For examples: Boys, don't go there. Ricky, please close the door.</p>

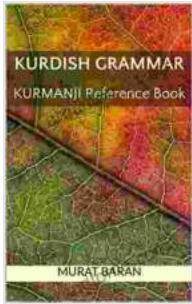
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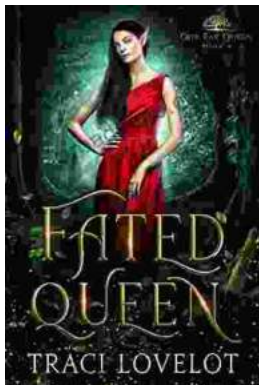
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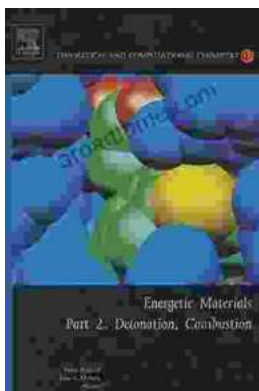
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
